

Chair Anthony Adams noting a quorum being present called the meeting to order at 7:02 p.m. Commissioner Demps gave the invocation.

II. PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

The Council and guests pledged allegiance to the flag of the United States of America.

III. INTRODUCTIONS

Chair Adams welcomed Diana Davis, Executive Director, Alachua County League of Cities and wife of Council Member Louie Davis; Paul Martin, citizen Dixie County; and Stew Lilker, Columbia County Observer. Councilman Ryan Fulford, Town of Cross City, was also in attendance at the meeting.

Chair Adams also welcomed new Council members Commissioner Rocky Ford, Columbia County; and Commissioner Edward Potts, City of Alachua, to the meeting.

Chair Adams asked that the consent agenda be approved.

Chair Adams asked that the regular agenda be approved.

ACTION: Commissioner Mortimer made the motion, with a second by Commissioner Meeks, to approve the regular agenda. The motion carried unanimously.

VI. NORTH CENTRAL FLORIDA REGIONAL PLANNING COUNCIL PRESENTATION YEAR 2022

Scott Koons, Executive Director, gave a presentation which reviewed Council activities during the past year in the Regional Planning, Public Safety, Economic Development,

Local Government Assistance and Transportation Programs of the Council. In particular, he highlighted the services that the Council provides, which benefit its local governments, including community planning assistance, grant application and administration services, transportation planning assistance, hazardous waste monitoring, emergency response planning assistance, and economic development activities. Chair Adams thanked Mr. Koons for his presentation.

Commissioner Bouie Hutchinson, Chair of the Clearinghouse Committee, reported that the Clearinghouse Committee met in person and virtually via communications media technology earlier in the evening and reviewed the following local government comprehensive plan amendments which were included on the Council agenda for consideration.

Commissioner Bouie Hutchinson stated with regards to these items, the Committee found that the local government comprehensive plans, as amended, were not anticipated to result in significant adverse impacts to regional facilities, Natural Resources of Regional Significance or adjacent local governments. She stated that the Committee recommends forwarding these findings to the respective local governments and the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity.

C. Program Committee - Fiscal Year 2023-24 Overall Program Design

Commissioner Janice Mortimer, Council Vice-Chair and Program Committee Chair, gave the Program Committee Report. She stated that the Program Committee met on March 23, 2023 to review a draft of the Overall Program Design for the coming year. She stated that this document is used as a basis for the development of a budget and is also to give instruction to staff as to the work which is to be done during the next year. Commissioner Mortimer stated that there are no changes proposed in the Overall Program Design which include new programs not previously discussed and/or approved by the Council.

ACTION: Commissioner Mortimer made the motion, with a second by Commissioner Meeks to approve the Fiscal Year 2023-24 Overall Program Design as recommended by the Program Committee. The motion carried unanimously.

D. Finance Committee - Fiscal Year 2023-24 Budget

Commissioner Fletcher Hope, Council Treasurer and Finance Committee Chair, gave the Finance Committee Report. He stated that the Finance Committee met virtually via communications media technology on May 17, 2023 to review the proposed Fiscal Year 2023-24 budget. He stated, the anticipated expenditures for next year will be \$1,629,100 which is (\$76,100) less than the current year budget. Commissioner Hope also stated, almost all funds to be expended by the Council are received through contracts for services and grants. He stated there is one exception: Member local governments pay dues, which are proposed to remain at \$0.30 per capita for the 42nd year, and will produce approximately \$171,700.

Commissioner Hope noted that the most significant policy decision that must be made with respect to the budget is related to personnel. There is provision for a total of seven full-time staff positions, plus funds for part-time positions, which is one less full-time staff position than budgeted for the current year. The budget includes a recurring increase across the board for all employees, including the Executive Director, equal to two percent of the salary for each employee and one percent of the salary budget for merit increases for all employees, except the Executive Director.

ACTION: Commissioner Hope made the motion, with a second by Commissioner Demps, to approve the Fiscal Year 2023-24 budget as recommended by the Finance Committee. The motion carried unanimously.

E. Nominating Committee - Program Year 2023-24 Election of Officers

Commissioner Thomas Demps, Council Immediate Past Chair and Nominating Committee Chair, gave the Nominating Committee report. He stated that the Nominating Committee met virtually via communications media technology on May 16, 2023 to prepare, for the Council's consideration, recommendations concerning officers for Program Year 2023-24.

He stated that the Nominating Committee recommendations for officers are, as follows:

Chair - Janice Mortimer, City of Starke Vice-Chair - Fletcher Hope, City of Archer Treasurer - Robert Brown, Hamilton County Secretary - John Meeks, Levy County Immediate Past Chair - Anthony Adams, Lafayette County Chair Adams asked for any nominations from the floor. Hearing no nominations from the floor, he closed the nominations.

ACTION: Commissioner Demps made the motion, with a second by Commissioner Wheeler to elect the slate of nominees for officers to a one-year term for Program Year 2023-24 as recommended by the Nominating Committee. The motion carried unanimously.

IX. EX-OFFICIO MEMBER REPORTS

David Tyler, Rural Transportation Planning Manager, Florida Department of Transportation District 2, discussed the 2020 Census Urban Area Boundary designations. He stated that the District will be providing local governments technical assistance concerning this matter during the coming months.

Luzette Musen, Land Use Planning Biologist, Florida Fish and Wildlife Conservation Commission, North Central Region, stated that the Commission offers wildlife conservation planning services to landowners and local governments throughout the region.

Ben Glass, Legislative and Community Affairs Chief, Suwannee River Water Management District, stated that the comments received by the District concerning updated Federal Emergency Management Agency, Flood Insurance Rate Maps for the Santa Fe River Watershed have been submitted by the District to the Federal Emergency Management Agency.

Kathryn Craver, Outreach/Communications Director, Florida Department of Environmental Protection, Northeast District, discussed funding for conservation land acquisition approved by the Legislature in the Fiscal Year 2023-24 budget concerning the Florida Wildlife Corridor and Florida Forever Program. She also stated that the Northeast District is available to assist local governments and individuals concerning permit applications and Department regulatory compliance issues.

X. CITIZEN COMMENTS

Stew Lilker, Columbia County Observer, discussed the Council meeting calendar, Council meeting public notice requirements and a regional utility consortium proposed by Columbia County.

XI. EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR REPORT

A. Florida Regional Councils Association Monthly Activity Report

Mr. Koons reported that the Florida Regional Councils Association is the statewide organization of the ten regional planning councils. He stated that the Association strengthens Florida's regional planning councils, partners with government and the business community to enhance regional economic prosperity and improves the consistency and quality of regional planning councils programs to ensure they add value to state, regional and local initiatives. Mr. Koons also stated that the Association strives to accomplish these goals by carrying out the activities listed in the April 2023 activity report included in the Council meeting packet. He reviewed the activities listed in the April 2023 report.

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B. Florida Chamber Foundation ScorecardTM

Mr. Koons reported that the Florida Chamber Foundation has developed the Florida ScorecardTM to provide Florida leaders the metrics needed to secure Florida's future. He stated that the Florida Chamber Foundation's objective to developing a 20-year, statewide strategic plan requires a commitment to measuring our current status and progress toward the stated goals of the Six Pillars 20-year Strategic Plan. Mr. Koons noted that the Scorecard reports metrics for each of the following Six Pillars: Talent and Supply Education, Innovation and Economic Development, Infrastructure and Growth Leadership, Business Climate and Competitiveness, Civic and Governance Systems, and Quality of Life and Quality Places. He reviewed the May 2023 ScorecardTM that was included in the Council meeting packet.

C. Legislative Report

Mr. Koons stated the 2023 Legislature Session convened on March 7, 2023 and adjourned on May 5, 2023. He reported on bills of interest to the Council and member local governments.

D. Financial Disclosure Report Filing

Mr. Koons reported that all members of the Council are required to file a financial disclosure form by July 1st of each year. He stated that Council members must file a financial disclosure forms filed by county commissioners and city commissioners for their elected offices fulfills this requirement. Mr. Koons noted that local elected officials are required to file the form online this year and all other filers will be required to file the form online next year. He stated gubernatorial members must file a financial disclosure form with the Supervisor of Elections office in their respective counties to fulfill this requirement. Mr. Koons noted gubernatorial members will be receiving a copy of the financial disclosure form in the mail within the next few weeks.

XII. COUNCIL MEMBER ANNOUNCEMENTS -

Commissioner Meeks announced that the Florida Association of Counties will be conducting a webinar on June 7, 2023 at 3:00 p.m. concerning the local elected officials electronic filing process for financial disclosure forms.

Mr. Koons presented Chair Adams with a John Moran framed landscape photograph of the Florida Trail at the Suwannee River for his service as Chair.

XIII. NEXT MEETING

Chair Adams stated that the next Council meeting is scheduled to be held on June 22, 2023.



SUBJECT: Broadband Opportunity Grant Program

On May 26, 2023, the third set of awards through the Broadband Opportunity Grant Program was made to expand access to broadband internet for underserved communities. A total of \$60 million was awarded for 22 projects in 19 counties for broadband internet expansion that will impact nearly 58, 000 unserved residential, educational, business and community locations.

These awards are in addition to the \$144 million awarded on February 2, 2023 and \$22 million awarded on April 10, 2023, bringing Florida's total investment to \$226 million for the expansion of broadband Internet in Florida's rural communities. The first set of awards included \$47,882,642 for 14 projects in the north central Florida region. The second set of awards included \$15,000,000 for three projects in the north central Florida region.

Administered by the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity, the Broadband Opportunity Program funds the installation and deployment of broadband internet infrastructure in unserved communities, providing valuable access to telehealth, economic, educational and workforce development opportunities.

A total of \$14,973,800 in funding was awarded to the following four projects in the north central Florida region through the Broadband Opportunity Program:

- Cities of Cedar Key and Chiefland, and the Towns of Inglis and Otter Creek (\$5,000,000) to add 1,097 miles of fiber optic cable to provide 1,238 unserved locations within Dixie County and Levy County with symmetrical download and upload speeds of 1 gigabit per second.
- Cities of Fanning Springs and Trenton (\$4,948,800) to add 100 square miles of fixed wireless coverage to provide 1,981 unserved locations within Gilchrist County with minimum download speed of 100 megabits per second and upload speed of 20 megabits per second.
- Cities of Hampton and Starke (\$5,000,000) to add 89 miles of fiber optic cable to provide 960 unserved locations within Bradford County with symmetrical download and upload speeds of 1 gigabit per second.
- City of Williston (\$25,000) to add 20 square miles of fixed wireless coverage to provide 1,000 unserved locations within Levy County with minimum download speed of 100 megabits per second and upload speed of 30 megabits of per second.

On May 31, 2023, more than \$15 million was awarded to five rural communities through the Rural Infrastructure Fund program to support community economic development projects that will strengthen public infrastructure and expand job opportunities for residents.

Administered by the Florida Department of Economic Opportunity, the Rural Infrastructure Fund program facilitates the planning, preparing and financing of infrastructure projects in rural communities. Funded projects encourage job creation, capital investment and the strengthening and diversification of rural economies.

During Fiscal Year 2022-23, \$32.5 million has been awarded to rural communities through the Rural Infrastructure Fund program. On October 27, 2022, nearly \$5 million was awarded for infrastructure in rural communities. On December 20, 2022, more than \$7.1 million was awarded to support rural communities through the Rural Infrastructure Fund program. On March 28, 2023, more than \$5.4 million was awarded to four small and rural communities.

Strategic investments in small and rural communities through programs like the Rural Infrastructure Fund and the Florida Job Growth Grant Fund provide regional benefits that are critical to strengthening communities for generations to come.

A total of \$9,600,000 in funding was awarded to the following local government in the north central Florida region through the Rural Infrastructure Fund program.

• Suwannee County (\$9,600,000) - to construct a wastewater treatment plant and install collection lines to create 269 jobs. The Suwannee County award through the Rural Infrastructure Fund program is in conjunction with the more than \$1.9 million awarded last year to Suwannee County through the Florida Job Growth Grant Fund for infrastructure expansion in August 2022, and more than \$760,000 awarded to Suwannee County through Rural Infrastructure Fund in December 2022 for infrastructure to support economic development opportunities.
