CALL TO ORDER

Ed Poppell

Chair Lee Pinkoson called the meeting to order at 5:05 p.m. He noted that a quorum was not present. He asked MTPO staff for a suggestion for items to discuss while awaiting a quorum.

Mr. Marlie Sanderson, MTPO Director of Transportation Planning, stated that agenda item VII. Archer Road Safety Project could be discussed.

Chair Pinkoson requested discussion of agenda item VII. Archer Road Safety Project.

VII. ARCHER ROAD SAFETY PROJECT

Mr. Sanderson stated that Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) staff was present to discuss the Archer Road Safety Project.

Mr. Tony Falotico, FDOT District 2 Traffic Operations Engineer, discussed the Archer Road Safety Project and answered questions.

Mr. Sanderson stated that agenda item VI. Archer Road/SW 16th Avenue Project Development and Environmental Study could also be discussed.

VI. ARCHER ROAD/SW 16TH AVENUE PROJECT DEVELOPMENT AND ENVIRONMENTAL STUDY

Mr. Sanderson stated that the City's consultant has submitted alternatives for the Archer Road/SW 16th Avenue Project Development and Environment (PD&E) Study.

Mr. Paul Cherry, Kimley-Horn Traffic Engineer, discussed the alternatives for the Archer Road/SW 16th Avenue PD&E Study and answered questions.

Ms. Jane Bowmen Hilton discussed her concerns regarding the project.

Mr. Ed Poppell, University of Florida Vice President for Business Affairs, discussed the University's concerns regarding safety for the existing campus and the projects to be developed in the area.

Mr. Cherry said that forecasted traffic growth was considered for the alternatives. He added that MTPO members would be provided with additional traffic information.

Mr. Rod Owens discussed his concerns regarding the project.

A quorum of the MTPO was present at this time.

I. APPROVAL OF THE MEETING AGENDA AND CONSENT AGENDA

Mr. Sanderson asked for approval of the consent agenda and remaining meeting agenda.

ACTION: Commissioner DeLaney moved to approve the balance of the Meeting Agenda with agenda items IV. Public Involvement Plan Update and V. Citizens Advisory Committee Vacant Positions and Designate Member Positions discussed first.

Mayor Hanrahan seconded; motion passed unanimously.

ACTION: Commissioner DeLaney moved to approve the Consent Agenda amended to vote separately on CA.2 SW 20th Avenue Scoping Plans. Mayor Hanrahan seconded; motion passed unanimously.

Commissioner Delaney declared a conflict of interest regarding CA.2 SW 20th Avenue Scoping plans.

ACTION: Commissioner DeLaney moved to approve CA.2 SW 20th Avenue Scoping Plans. Mayor Hanrahan seconded.

Chair Pinkoson noted that the conflict declaration resulted in a lack of a quorum of the MTPO.

After consulting with Florida Department of Transportation staff, Mr. Sanderson said that CA.2 SW 20th Avenue Scoping plans could be placed on the MTPO's next meeting agenda.

A member of the MTPO noted that Ms. Roberta Hodges, former City of Archer Commissioner, passed away. She also recognized the Commissioner's advocacy for the City of Archer's interests.

IV. PUBLIC INVOLVEMENT PLAN UPDATE

Mr. Sanderson stated that the MTPO is required to review its Public Involvement Plan and revise it as needed. He discussed revisions to the plan and answered questions.

ACTION: Commissioner Hawkins moved to approve revisions to the Public Involvement Plan. Commissioner DeLaney seconded; motion passed unanimously.

V. CITIZENS ADVISORY COMMITTEE (CAC) VACANT POSITIONS AND DESIGNATE MEMBER POSITIONS

Mr. Sanderson stated that the MTPO needs to fill six vacant positions on its CAC. He said that there is one position that has a term of office through December, 2009 and five positions that have a term of office through December, 2011. He added that the MTPO may also appoint up to three CAC Designate Members. He asked if there were any applicants present to speak on their candidacy.

The following persons spoke regarding their candidacy for the CAC:

Seth Lane

Mr. Sanderson recommended that the MTPO, as it has in the past, vote for six candidates, with the five highest vote recipients being appointed to the CAC for a term ending December 2011, the sixth highest vote recipient being appointed to the CAC for a term ending December 2009, and the next three vote recipients being CAC Designate Members. He conducted a rollcall vote. He reported the results of the CAC appointment vote.

ACTION: Commissioner Chestnut moved to appoint Mary Ann DeMatas and Seth Lane and reappoint Rob Brinkman, James Samec and Ruth Steiner to the CAC for a term through December, 2011. Commissioner Lowe seconded; motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Sanderson conducted a rollcall vote for the CAC 2009 term. He reported the results of the CAC appointment vote.

ACTION: Commissioner Chestnut moved to reappoint George Fletcher to the CAC for a term through December, 2009. Commissioner DeLaney seconded; motion passed.

According to the MTPO ballot, the three CAC Designate Members, appointed for a term through December, 2009, are Sheera Greene, Thomas Collette and Joy Glanzer.

A member of the MTPO asked why there would not be readvertisements for CAC vacancies.

Mr. Sanderson stated that the MTPO, at its December 2008 meeting, established CAC Designate Members who would fill CAC vacancies that occurred during the calendar year.

II. SW 62ND BOULEVARD- INTERIM PROJECTS

Mr. Sanderson stated that the MTPO, at its November meeting, approved the scoping plans for the three SW 62nd Boulevard Interim Projects. He said that the MTPO needs to amend its Transportation Improvement Program so that these projects may be constructed. He noted that the funding for right-of-way would become construction funding.

ACTION: Commissioner Delaney moved to amend the TIP to:

- 1. delete right-of-way funding for the SW 62nd Connector; and
- 2. add construction funding for the three SW 62nd Boulevard Interim Projects.

Commissioner Hawkins seconded. Mr. Sanderson conducted a rollcall vote. The results of the vote follows:

III. FLORIDA DEPARTMENT OF TRANSPORTATION (FDOT) TENTATIVE FIVE YEAR WORK PROGRAM

Mr. Sanderson stated that the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) has requested comments concerning its <u>Tentative Five Year Work Program for Fiscal Years 2009/2010 to 2013/2014</u>.

Mr. James Bennett, FDOT District 2 Urban Area Transportation Development Engineer, discussed the Tentative Five Year Work Program and answered questions.

VIII. ELECTION OF MTPO OFFICERS

Mr. Sanderson stated that the MTPO needed to elect a Chair, Vice-Chair and Secretary/Treasurer for the coming year. He identified the current officers and noted that the MTPO Chair traditionally alternates between the City Commission and County Commission.

ACTION: Commissioner Chestnut moved to elect Commissioner Henry as the MTPO Chair, Commissioner DeLaney as the MTPO Vice Chair and Commissioner Donovan as MTPO Secretary/Treasurer. Commissioner Lowe seconded.

FRIENDLY AMENDMENT:

Mayor Hanrahan moved to amend the slate to elect Commissioner Hawkins as the MTPO Secretary/Treasurer. Commissioners Chestnut and Lowe accepted the amendment.

ACTION AS AMENDED:

Commissioner Chestnut moved to elect Commissioner Henry as the MTPO Chair, Commissioner DeLaney as the MTPO Vice Chair and Commissioner Hawkins as MTPO Secretary/Treasurer. Commissioner Lowe seconded; motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Sanderson presented a plaque to Chair Pinkoson.

IX. MTPO AUDIT REVIEW COMMITTEE

Mr. Sanderson requested that the MTPO appoint two members to an Audit Review Committee. He noted that the MTPO Secretary/Treasurer traditionally chairs this committee.

ACTION: Commissioner Chestnut moved to appoint Commissioner Hawkins and Commissioner Byerly to the MTPO Audit Review Committee and to have Commissioner Hawkins serve as Committee Chair. Commissioner Lowe seconded; motion passed unanimously.

X. STATEWIDE ORGANIZATION OF METROPOLITAN PLANNING ORGANIZATIONS (MPOAC)

Mr. Sanderson asked the MTPO to appoint voting and alternate representatives to the Florida Metropolitan Planning Organization Advisory Council (MPOAC) for calendar year 2008.

ACTION: Mayor Hanrahan moved to reappoint Commissioner DeLaney as the MPOAC voting representative and Mayor Hanrahan as the MPOAC alternate representative. Commissioner Chestnut seconded; motion passed unanimously.

XI. NEXT MTPO MEETING

Mr. Sanderson stated that there is no business requiring the MTPO to meet in January. He said the next MTPO meeting is scheduled for February 9th.

IX. COMMENTS

A. MTPO MEMBERS

A member of the MTPO discussed the Newberry Road Charrette and thanked City staff for presenting information concerning Bus Rapid Transit.

Mr. Sanderson noted that MTPO staff would also be participating in the charrette.

Commissioner Paula DeLaney, Alachua County Transportation Disadvantaged Coordinating Board Chair, reported on the County's transportation disadvantaged program coordinator, MV Transportation's, transition of general managers. She also reported that the paratransit rider copay has increased from \$2.00 to \$3.00. She noted she was concerned about persons not being able to meet the co-pay.

B. CITIZENS

There were no citizens comments.

C. CHAIRS REPORT

Chair Pinkoson thanked the MTPO members and staff.

ADJOURNMENT Chair Pinkoson adjourned the meeting at 7:10 p.m. Date William Thomas Hawkins, Secretary/Treasurer

CALL TO ORDER

Chair Scherwin Henry called the meeting to order at 6:04 p.m.

I. APPROVAL OF THE MEETING AGENDA

Mr. Marlie Sanderson, MTPO Director of Transportation Planning, asked for approval of the meeting agenda. He discussed the Federal American Recovery & Reinvestment Act of 2009 and the need for this emergency MTPO meeting.

ACTION: Commissioner DeLaney moved to approve the Meeting Agenda. Commissioner Hawkins seconded; motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Sanderson stated that there were visitors from the City of Newberry that wanted to discuss a project in Newberry. He suggested that the City of Newberry representatives could discuss their concerns after the MTPO completes Agenda Item III. Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) Amendments.

Chair Henry stated that the Project Priorities for Federal American Recovery & Reinvestment Act of 2009- Rural Alachua County could be discussed after the MTPO completes Agenda Item III. TIP Amendments.

II. PROJECT PRIORITIES FOR FEDERAL AMERICAN RECOVERY & REINVESTMENT ACT OF 2009

Mr. Sanderson stated that the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) has requested that the MTPO provide prioritized lists of transportation (including transit) and transit-only projects for funding under the Federal American Recovery & Reinvestment Act of 2009. He discussed draft transportation and transit project priority lists and answered questions.

Mr. James Bennett, FDOT District 2 Planning Manager, discussed the Federal American Recovery & Reinvestment Act of 2009. He noted that eligible projects had to be "shovel ready" within 120 days.

Ms. Teresa Scott, City of Gainesville Public Works Director, discussed the City's project recommendations and answered questions.

Mr. Jesus Gomez, Regional Transit System (RTS) Director, discussed the transit project priorities and answered questions.

Mr. Sanderson reported that, at this time, there are no funding estimates for transit projects.

A member of the MTPO requested removal of the Bus Rapid Transit corridor references from the transit priority recommendations.

Mr. Gomez and Ms. Scott continued discussion of transit project priorities and answered questions.

Mr. Bennett suggested using the term "transit vehicle purchase" in lieu of "purchase replacement buses." He said that there would have to be FDOT Work Program, State Transportation Improvement Program (STIP) and MTPO Transportation Improvement Program amendments for projects that meet the 120-day time limit. He discussed the Main Street roundabout project. He noted that the roundabout design plans are not "shovel ready."

Mr. Allan Penksa, Gainesville Regional Airport Director, discussed the Airport Access Road project and two airport resurfacing projects and answered questions.

Mr. Bennett noted that the airport projects are not federal aid-eligible facilities and, therefore, not eligible for Stimulus funding. He also discussed the Stimulus funds reporting requirements.

Chair Henry stated he had to leave and passed the gavel to Vice Chair DeLaney.

Mr. Sanderson reported that there are no additional "shovel ready" projects in the MTPO List of Priority Projects and TIP.

A member of the MTPO suggested adding transit vehicle purchase to Exhibit 2, since those funds could be flexed.

Mr. Michael Fay, Alachua County Program Development Manager, suggested adding the "shovel ready" Fort Clarke Boulevard Milling and Resurfacing Project which costs \$2 million.

Mr. Bennett noted that there was no relaxation of federal funding requirements with the exception of the waiver of local match.

Mr. Randall Reid, Alachua County Manager, asked that the County Commission approve the rural Alachua County project priority list.

ACTION: Mayor Hanrahan moved to approve, for funding under the Federal American Recovery & Reinvestment Act of 2009, the:

- 1. transit priority list, as amended to revise priority RTS-7 to delete references to specific Bus Rapid Transit corridors; and
- 2. non-transit priority list, as amended to add:
 - A. Priority 5- transit vehicle purchase at a \$5 million funding level; and
 - B. Priority 6- Ft. Clarke Boulevard resurfacing project.

Commissioner Hawkins seconded.

FRIENDLY AMENDMENT:

Commissioner Donovan moved to revise transit priority RTS-1 to refer to transit vehicles in lieu of replacement buses. Both Mayor Hanrahan and Commissioner Hawkins accepted the amendment.

Mr. Keith Ashby, City of Newberry Manager, discussed the Advanced Nutrient Food (ANF)-Techcom Project in Newberry. He noted that, while Newberry is not in the Gainesville Metropolitan Area, there are countywide economic impacts from the ANF-Techcom Project.

ORIGINAL ACTION AS AMENDED:

Mayor Hanrahan moved to approve, for funding under the Federal American Recovery & Reinvestment Act of 2009, the:

- 1. transit priority list, as amended (see Exhibit 1) to revise priorities:
 - A. RTS-1 to refer to transit vehicles in lieu of replacement buses; and
 - B. RTS-7 to delete references to specific Bus Rapid Transit corridors; and
- 2. non-transit priority list, as amended (see Exhibit 2) to add:
 - A. Priority 5- transit vehicle purchase at a \$5 million funding level; and
 - B. Priority 6- Ft. Clarke Boulevard Resurfacing Project.

Commissioner Pinkoson seconded; motion passed unanimously.

Mr. Reid stated that there was not a publicly-noticed County Commission meeting.

Mr. Dave Schwartz, MTPO Attorney, stated that the County Commissioners, as MTPO members, could discuss the rural area project list.

III. TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (TIP) AMENDMENTS

Mr. Sanderson asked that the MTPO amend the TIP before discussion on rural Alachua County priority projects. He said that these amendments would be contingent upon funding being provided under the Federal American Recovery & Reinvestment Act of 2009.

ACTION: Commissioner Byerly moved to amend the TIP to include the project priorities in Exhibit 1 and Exhibit 2 in Fiscal Year 2008/2009 contingent upon project priorities being funding under the Federal American Recovery & Reinvestment Act of 2009. Commissioner Long seconded. Mr. Sanderson conducted a rollcall vote. The results of the vote follows:

IV. PROJECT PRIORITIES FOR FEDERAL AMERICAN RECOVERY & REINVESTMENT ACT OF 2009- RURAL ALACHUA COUNTY

Mr. Sanderson noted that Commissioner John Martin, MTPO Rural Advisor, could not attend this MTPO meeting. He reported Commissioner Martin's endorsement of the City of Newberry and City of Waldo project recommendations for funding under the Federal American Recovery & Reinvestment Act of 2009.

ACTION: Commissioner Pinkoson moved to recommend that the MTPO:

1. send a letter to the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) stating that the MTPO endorses the Alachua County staff recommendations for project priorities within rural Alachua County for funding under the Federal American Recovery & Reinvestment Act of 2009 as shown in the attached Exhibit 3; and

2. direct staff to prepare Federal American Recovery & Reinvestment Act of 2009 project priorities materials for the Thursday, February 19, 2009 Alachua County Commission meeting.

Commissioner Long seconded.

Vice Chair DeLaney asked about the status of the 4-laning of Archer Road to the City of Archer.

Mr. Sanderson stated that 4-laning of Archer Road was in the MTPO's Long Range Transportation Plan. He noted that it was not in the Cost Feasible Plan.

Mr. Fay discussed the Archer Road project. He noted that it was the County's number one road construction priority. He also discussed the SW 91st Street Resurfacing Project. He noted that it was not "shovel ready."

Mr. Bennett stated that the County is not required to recommend funding projects outside the Gainesville Metropolitan Area.

Mr. Reid noted that a portion of a rural resurfacing project on the federal aid highway system could be recommended for Stimulus funding.

Mr. Dave Cerlanek, Alachua County Assistant Public Works Director, discussed the County's project priorities and answered questions.

Mayor John Glanzer, City of Newberry, and Mr. Ashby discussed the ANF project.

Mr. Ron Carpenter spoke in support of the creation of jobs.

Mr. Bennett reported that, due to the time constraint placed on FDOT District 2, he would submit recommendations regarding rural Alachua County to FDOT Central Office on Thursday, February 19, 2009 with or without input from the County Commission.

SUBSTITUTE ACTION:

Commissioner Byerly moved send a letter to the FDOT stating that the MTPO endorses the milling and resurfacing of a section of SW 122nd Street for \$1.3 million. Commissioner Donovan seconded; motion failed 1 to 7.

Mr. Ashby noted that the project was non-union because no unions have been involved.

ORIGINAL ACTION RESTATED:

Commissioner Pinkoson moved to recommend that the MTPO:

- 1. send a letter to the Florida Department of Transportation (FDOT) stating that the MTPO endorses the Alachua County staff recommendations for project priorities within rural Alachua County for funding under the Federal American Recovery & Reinvestment Act of 2009 (as shown in the attached Exhibit 3); and
- 2. direct staff to prepare Federal American Recovery & Reinvestment Act of 2009 project priorities materials for the Thursday, February 19, 2009 Alachua County Commission meeting.

Commissioner Long seconded; motion passed 7 to 1.

BACKGROUND

RTS has contracted with Tindale-Oliver & Associates, Inc. (TOA) to prepare its Ten-Year Transit Development Plan, Major Update. RTS reserved \$100,000 to conduct the Transit Development Plan update, but needs an additional \$18,026 to cover the total project budget.

According to RTS staff,

"We believe all sections of the TOA proposal are important to comply with the new FDOT TDP requirements and therefore believe cuts are difficult to make to the proposed budget. TOA mentioned that the on-board survey data (O-D pairs information) is often used in regional travel demand models, so we thought you might like to have this information and would hopefully be able to assist us by paying the expense to complete the survey. The on-board survey would cover 50% of all weekday passenger trips and result in the distribution of about 21,000 surveys and potentially result in over 8,400 returned surveys (40% return)."

Good Morning Mr. Sanderson,

I have been asked by the MPOAC to gauge interest for implementing the TIP Reporter Tool (Flyer Attached) that was adopted as a formal motion at the MPOAC Meeting January 22nd, 2009 to: "Support development of an Interactive TIP statewide platform which would be used by all MPOs and which would be procured, managed and supported by FDOT. Any changes to the platform would be with the concurrence of MPOs."

My understanding is that for those MPO's interested FDOT would consider providing (please note that this has not been formalized as of yet as FDOT wants to see how much interest there is) a 50% match that pays for the initial setup of the TIP (i.e. a one-time cost of \$9,500) while the MPO's would match with the maintenance cost of \$9,600 which includes software updates, fixes, troubleshooting, application hosting, and some GIS services.

To date 7 MPOs have already signed-up and are either fully-implemented or are in the process of implementation. We believe if we get started right away, we could have the application running for about 9 of the remaining 19 MPOs by July 1 (FDOT's Adopted Work Program date) and the rest implemented by the end of the year.

Please let me know as soon as you can if you are interested in signing-up for the TIP Reporter so that I can report back to the MPOAC and FDOT.



At the November 13, 2008 Gainesville Metropolitan Transportation Planning Organization (MTPO) Board meeting, the MTPO requested that the locally preferred corridor cross-section be modified to include future Bus Rapid Transit in the median and return with a plan for implementation.


The project team, in coordination with the Gainesville Regional Transit System, prepared a modified cross-section in response to this direction. The Gainesville Regional Transit System staff has verified that this cross-section is consistent with the bus rapid transit planning currently underway. Construction of the roadway using this cross-section is feasible. It will also avoid any significant impacts to conservation properties, although construction would result in a slight increase in functional loss of wetlands versus the four-lane urban roadway cross-section previously presented.


The construction cost of the modified cross-section, with an appropriately sized median that could support future BRT, is \$89.6 million. If the bus rapid transit stations, raceways and pads are constructed as part of the modified roadway, the total costs would be \$98.9 million. The construction costs for the four-lane urban roadway, previously presented, is \$86.7 million.

HNTB is currently preparing a draft preliminary engineering report and an environmental assessment for this project that includes the modified cross-section as the locally preferred alternative. A presentation is planned for the March MTPO Meeting as an informational item in advance of our public hearing for this project.







Modified Alignment for BRT




Modified Alignment (40-ft Median) Windmeadows Boulevard to Southwest 40th Boulevard
